Some Facts and Figures

- 1. Total distance travelled by team Turbo Safari will be about 5850 nautical miles or 10,840kms.
- 2. Total estimated flying time is 2,642 minutes or forty four hours and two minutes.
- We have twenty two flights or stages (one stage is one take off and one landing), usually there is one flight per flying day.
- 4. The average flight time is almost exactly two hours, the shortest flight s on the race being Mt Isa to Adels Grove and Daly Waters to Katherine at one hour. The longest single flight being Katherine to Kununurra via the Bungle Bungles which is three hours.
- 5. The longest single flying day is Esperance to Coober Pedy, the two flights visa Forrest taking five hours and thirty six minutes in total.
- 6. Team Turbo Safari expects to use 2,706 litres of fuel, a little over 60 litres for every hour flying time.
- 7. Our aircraft, VH-WKG, will cruise at approximately 140 knots (nautical miles per hour) or approximately 260km/hr.
- 8. The 2018 event has 42 teams taking part, including a team from New Zealand.
- 9. The 2018 event is the 10th Outback Air Race and the event is celebrating its 30th anniversary.
- 10. The RFDS is celebrating its 90th Birthday in 2018!!!!

Team Turbo Safari will have a number of fundraising events between now and their departure in August to raise funds for the Royal Flying Doctor Service. By supporting these you will be supporting the Royal Flying Doctor Service.



The Outback Air Race

What is the Outback Air Race?

The Outback Air Race (OAR) is a GPS-based navigation time trial throughout the remote Australian outback. In 2018 it will host 100 competitors in 41 aircraft, in which pilots nominate an elapsed time between two visual waypoints, receiving points for both time and location accuracy. The Outback Air Race exists to raise funds for the Royal Flying Doctor Service (RFDS). Since 1996 competitors and spectators have raised over \$2.1 million, with funds from each race going towards outfitting RFDS aircraft with essential medical equipment, vital for treating sick and injured patients.

The Outback Air Race is held every three years with the 2018 event being held from Sunday 19th August until Friday 31st August 2018. Starting in Archerfield, near Brisbane, QLD, and finishing in Broome, WA.

The OAR challenges reflects those often faced by the RFDS as they assist those in remote areas during medical emergencies, and also as they go above and beyond in their daily delivery of health, family and community support. On any given day the RFDS makes an average of 775 patient contacts, 145 patient transports and flies over 71,664 kilometres.

Despite growing demand for services, Federal Government funding has remained largely unchanged since 2006. Team Turbo Safari is registered to participate in the 2018 race and the team aims to raise at least **\$20,000** by the conclusion of the event in September 2018.

Why is the team name "Turbo Safari"?

In the 2015 OAR Ed flew a 4-seater aircraft made by the French company Pierre Avion Robin. known as a Robin Safari and called his team "Robin Safari" in the event. In 2018 we are flying a 6-seater aircraft made by the Piper corporation a PA-32RT-300T, known as a Turbo Lance. To keep continuity from the last event we combined elements from both names and have called the team "Turbo Safari".
